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
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

BIOGRAPHY

Dr. George Preti



Dr. George Preti received his PhD in Organic Chemistry in 1971 from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, with a specialty in Organic Mass Spectrometry. That

same year he joined the Monell Chemical Senses Center in Philadelphia. The Center, a non-profit research institute, is renowned throughout the world as a leader in multidisciplinary, basic research in olfaction and gustation.

Dr. Preti is a Full Member of Monell and an Adjunct Professor in the Department of Dermatology, School of Medicine at the University of Pennsylvania. For more than 3 decades, his research has focused upon the nature, origin and functional significance of human odors. His current studies center upon a bioassay-guided approach to the identification of human pheromones, human and agricultural malodor suppression and examining the "odor-print" of humans.

In addition to having published numerous peer-reviewed papers and reviews, Dr. Preti holds more than a dozen patents related to deodorancy, odor-mediated control of the menstrual cycle and the use of odors in diagnosis. His unique area of research has resulted in hundreds of clinician-directed referrals of patients with idiopathic bodyand oral malodor production problems. His efforts in this area have revealed a large, undiagnosed population of people suffering from trimethylaminuria, an odor-producing genetic disorder.

In addition his research has resulted in frequent citations and coverage in print and electronic media throughout the world. His research on human and agricultural odors was featured in the New York Times Magazine section on 10/15/00 ("The War on Stink") as well as described in a feature

article about Monell's research done by Chemical and Engineering News: 1/7/02 issue. Several television segments have also described his research into body and oral odors, including Good Morning America, Inside Edition and Discovery Channel Canada: Human Wildlife: the Life that Lives on Us. Most recently his study describing primer and modulator pheromones found within axillary secretions was the subject of world-wide press coverage.

NEWS ATOMS DEATHS

Charles Martin Saffer, Jr., former technical director with Witco Corp., November 21 at 89. He served as a naval officer in two tours of combat duty in World War II in the European Theater of Operations, retiring as Lieutenant Commander. He was technical director of the inorganic specialties division of Witco, retiring in 1982, and held several U.S. and foreign patents and authored a number of technical articles.

Dr. Saffer received a traveling fellowship to Oxford University in 1939 where he was a research fellow in chemistry. Later he served as secretary of the Philadelphia branch of the Oxford Society.

Conrad Kowalski, former chemist and pharmaceutical company executive, December 11 at 57. He joined SmithKline in 1982 and was eventually named vice president of research, development, and production of new drugs. He held numerous patents and was a widely published author and lecturer. He left GlaxoSmithKline in 2001 and worked as a consultant before joining Cephalon as director of international chemical development.

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



The Nine Lives of Edgar Fahs Smith

The University of Pennsylvania has produced an exhibit commemorating the 150th anniversary of the birth of the famous Penn chemist, Edgar Fahs Smith. The exhibit is in the Kamin Gallery on the first floor of the Van Pelt-Dietrich Library on Locust Walk between 34th and 36th Streets. It will be on display from October 19, 2004 to March 24, 2005.

Edgar Fahs Smith was a professor of Chemistry at the University of Pennsylvania from 1888-1920. He became Vice Provost in 1899 and Provost in 1911 (the equivalent of president today). The Edgar Fahs Smith Memorial Collection in the History of Chemistry, housed in the Annenberg Rare Book and Manuscript Library, is an ACS National Historic Landmark.

In addition, he was a founder of the Philadelphia Section and the only person to serve three terms as president of the American Chemical Society (1895, 1921, 1922). The Edgar Fahs Smith Memorial Lectureship,

sponsored by the University of Pennsylvania and the Philadelphia Section, is the oldest (1929) memorial lectureship listed by the ACS. Stop by the Van Pelt Library and visit the exhibit during its run.
