January 2025 has been an eventful month both in the US and globally. The American Chemical Society (ACS) announced its new <u>Strategic Plan</u>

<u>2025-2029</u> on January 1st. This plan captures the dynamic nature of the organization by focusing on supporting a global community. Approved by the ACS Board of Directors in December 2024, the new strategic plan is guided by a commitment to improve lives through the transforming power of chemistry. Its vision of a world built on science, and its mission to advance scientific knowledge, empower a global community, champion scientific integrity, and further define the path forward for the organization. The four core values of ACS are Passion for Science, Inclusion and Belonging, Lifelong Learning, and Sustainability. The four strategic goals are to Elevate the Reputation of Science, Empower Scientists, Enhance Community Engagement, and Deliver Innovative Solutions.

Our Section kicked off 2025 with the "Meet our Committees" event at the Workhorse Brewery in King of Prussia with 30 people attending, despite the cold weather following a winter storm. It was a pleasure to meet committee chairs, especially those meeting in person for the first time. Many great ideas were shared on how to better serve our members and plan new events. Additionally, we welcomed new volunteers to our committees to support the ACS Philly Section.

Another highlight in January was the Retirement Workshop led by former ACS President Bill Carroll. Organized by our Career Service Committee, this workshop was designed for those planning the next phase of their lives. NEWS ATOMS—*Alan Warren*

Joseph S. Francisco, professor of earth and environmental science and professor of chemistry at Penn will receive the 2025 Spectroscopy Award from the Spectroscopy Society of Pittsburgh. The award will be presented at Pittcon in Boston in March.

DEATHS

James L. Smith, retired microbiologist, May 31, 2024 at 94. From 1963 to 1971 he studied the effects of microorganisms on fats at the Agricultural Research Center in Beltsville, MD. He then moved to the Eastern Regional Research Center in Philadelphia where he studied the microbiology of meat fermentations and microbial food safety of meat products. He retired in 1990 and became a USDA collaborator at ERRC, serving as a mentor, and writing review articles and book chapters on food safety subjects. He was an ACS member for over 60 years.

Joseph A. Lannon, chemist and director of research and development, August 16th at 84. He first worked at Frankford Arsenal and in 1972 transferred to Picatinny Arsenal. From 2005 to 2010 he served as director of the armament R&D center (ARDEC) at Picatinny, overseeing a workforce of 3600 people, 64 laboratories, 800 buildings, and a budget of one billion dollars. In 2007 President George W. Bush and Commerce Secretary Carlos Gutierrez announced that ARDEC was

the first federal recipient of the prestigious Malcolm Baldridge National Quality Award for organizational excellence.

John Yardley, retired pharmaceutical chemist, October 17th at 89. Born in England, he moved to the USA to complete two post-doc positions. He was engaged by Wyeth-Ayerst and then Pfizer for over 35 years, retiring as associate director of chemistry.

Merrill Lynn, retired R&D chemist, November 3rd at 93. He worked for Dow Chemical, Esso (now Exxon) from 1961 to 1969, and then Corning from 1970 to 1995. He obtained a number of patents and developed new products. Some of his applications were for fiber optic cable, the first troponin test to detect heart attacks, equipment for collecting and testing blood samples, a catalytic converter component, and he helped in the development of Saran Wrap and blister packaging.

Abstract: Plastic is a fantastic material innovation in the 20th century. Due to its performance advantages, processability and cost-effectiveness, plastic has replaced most of our daily used materials, i.e., metals, glass, paper, etc. since its mass production in the middle of last century and is now ubiquitous, which also causes the waste pollution problem. In this talk, I will share the industrial perspective on the plastic waste pollution problem, the current efforts on the potential solutions and their limitations, as well as several misconceptions in this area. In addition, I'd share the thinking process on how and why we are proposing natural polymers as an alternative solution to complement the current societal efforts on curbing plastic waste pollution.

Biography: Dr. Jun Wang currently works as a Director in Packaging Innovation, Global Design and Packaging group, Colgate-Palmolive Company. Dr. Wang has his PhD in Polymer Chemistry and with over 30 years' experience on polymers. Between 2014-2020, he led the development of the first-of-its-kind recyclable plastic tube, which received recognitions from the recycling industry, including the APR (Association of Plastic Recyclers in NA) and PRE (Plastic Recyclers Europe). Recently, Dr. Wang initiated the consortium on natural polymers (NPC), together with the ACS Green Chemistry Institute, to seek an alternative solution to curb plastic pollution. Dr. Wang serves as co-chair for NPC and ACS CCC on Transformative Natural Polymers.

- 4) At least one, but not more than three, letters of support. One letter, of no more than 400 words must be from the teacher's current principal or supervisor. Additional letters of support, of no more than 400 words, may be sent by colleagues, members of the ACS who are familiar with the nominee's achievements, or former students and parents of former students.
- 5) The total nomination package should not exceed 30 pages.

- The nominee's ability to challenge and inspire students;
- Extracurricular work in chemistry or a chemical science by the nominee, including science fairs, science clubs, and activities that stimulate the interest of young people in chemistry and related sciences;
- A willingness to keep up-to-date in the field, as evidenced by the pursuit of a higher degree in chemistry or a chemical science, enrollment in refresher courses and summer institutes, regular attendance at scientific meetings, membership in professional organizations, and other means of self-improvement;
- Evidence of leadership and/or active involvement within the profession.

Abstract: Creativity is a blend of being able to think scientifically at a very high level and being able to articulate those ideas clearly to others. This blend of skill types is common. The proportions depend on many factors, including the type of work task, the number and types of people involved, being able to speak clearly, being able to listen with an open mind and with focus, and being able to plan and schedule the sequence of tasks in a way that has smooth transition from one task to another and being able to prioritize and adapt as timing, cost, and other factors modify the timing and priorities needed.

Although many clients hire a consultant for his/her high expertise in a specific scientific area that the client knows, often a client has little or no knowledge in the area. A consultant must be a teacher, tutor, and trainer in a way that quickly passes on the knowledge needed. This is especially true for a consultant if the work involves being an expert witness. That work is translating scientific knowledge into opinions in writing and verbally. Attorneys are very different than scientists in how they see and value things.

This presentation will focus on the soft skills of listening, focusing, setting schedules and deadlines, making effective to-do lists, time management and tricks to make it easier, and how to run effective meetings.

Biography: John C. Fetzer has written over fifty published articles on career development for scientists, including many on people and communications skills. He was the editor for the column "Building a Professional Career" that was published in the Springer Verlag journal *Analytical and Bioanalytical Chemistry*. He is the author of the book *Career Management for Chemists*.
